

These are optional vocabulary cards to show your child before reading the story to help with understanding. It is also a great idea to point out the words while reading the book!





Art Project:

Seed Mosaic

What you need for this activity:

*Various kinds of seeds (can be beans, corn etc.)

*Marker

*Construction paper of choice

*Non-toxic squeeze glue

Directions:

*For this project-just let your child(ren) be creative. Ask them to use the different seeds to make something. It could be garden related (like a flower) or just a design that interests them!

*Have your child(ren) form the design on the construction paper using their marker. Then ask them to put squeeze glue over top.

Finally, places seeds to cover the entirety of the design, creating the mosaic!



Pre-writing Activity:

Chalk Letters

What you need for this activity:

*Chalk

*Pavement

*Spray bottle or hose

*A nice day!

Directions:

*For this activity your child will work on their letter recognition skills. There are a few options for how to do this activity...

*Option one: Write the letters of the alphabet (capital and lowercase) all over the pavement (note they should not be in order)! When you call out a letter have children race to find them. At this point they can either spray it away to make it disappear or (if you don't have access to water) jump on it. Keep going until you have called all of the letters.

*Option two: Write only the capitals or only the lowercase letters depending on your child's needs-play the same as above.

*Option three: Write SOME of the capitals and lowercase letters (this may be a good option if there are fewer children). Then play the same as above.

*Option four: This option is good if your child(ren) already recognizes the capital and lowercase letters. Call out a letter and have your child(ren) write the letter on the pavement.

**For all of these options you can be creative! Instead of just writing the letters-you could write them inside of a flower design (to match the theme) or weather patterns (clouds, suns etc.)

<u>Math Activity:</u> <u>Flower Division</u>

What you need for this activity:

- Flower dividing page
- Child-safe scissors
- Non-toxic glue
- Writing utensil

Directions:

For this activity, your child(ren) will work on their beginning division skills!


Ask your child(ren) to cut out the flowers on the last page. Then have them divide them according to the flower boxes shown.


Optional-instead of printing out the pages, set out two small boxes (or even two pieces of paper). Have your child(ren) divide pompoms (or seeds or something similar) amongst the boxes.


Have them divide evens only -2,4,6,8

Language Activity:

Syllables

What you need for this activity:

*Garden Syllables page

*Writing utensil

Directions:

An important step in a child's learning to read is their understanding of syllables.


For this activity your child will write out three of the vocabulary words. The / mark a new syllable.

Ask your child to clap out the word for example "seed (clap) ling (clap)." ask them how many syllables they count and then have them write.

Another option is to show them the words and have them try to write the individual syllables on their own-this would be if they have a more advanced understanding of writing words already.

Science Activity:

Seed Planting and observation

What you need for this activity:

*Soil

*Seed of some type

*Small pot (an empty playdough container works great!)

*Optional-observation pages

Directions:

*For this activity your child(ren) will plant and observe a seed. Because the process for planting takes time, this activity will last two weeks.

*First give your child a seed to plant (or let them choose).

*Discuss with them that for a seed to grow it needs: soil, water, and sunlight. It must also be buried.

*Ask them to make a small hole in the soil and place the seed inside. Then cover it back up.

*Remind them that a seed needs water to grow and give it some water!

*Lastly, remind them that it also needs sunlight, have them choose a sunny spot to place their pot.

Have your child observe their seed each day to see if they notice any changes. Make sure they are also giving it water as needed!

Optionally-have them make their observations on the attached page. Otherwise, they can verbally make them-or draw a picture each day.
