

Art Project: Deer

What you need for this activity:

- *Child-safe scissors
- *Non-toxic glue
- *Outside materials: leaves, sticks, black soil or rock
- *Googly eyes or markers

Option one:

- *Deer print out
- *Non-toxic brown paint, paintbrush

Option two:

*Brown Construction paper

Directions:


Option one: Cut out the deer image (next page) and ask your child to paint it brown. Once it has dried, they may keep working on the deer.

Option two: If you (or your child(ren)) are able, draw an outline of a deer face (like the one below) and have your child(ren) cut out the image. Then decorate it.

Decoration recommendations: We love using outdoor materials for art and this theme is perfect for that.

We recommend using:

- * Leaves for the deer's ears
- *Sticks for adding antlers
- *Some black soil or a black rock for the nose
- *Non outdoor materials-googly eyes or markers for the eyes

What you need for this activity:


- *How to draw a raccoon page

Math Activity: Numbers Up

What you need for this activity:

- *Forest Animal cards
- *Number Cards

Directions:

*For this activity, your child will work on both their number recognition as-well-as their quantification skills.

*Follow the game directions

Numbers Up!

Directions:

For this activity, there must be at least 3 people to play.

One person (usually an adult) is the one who will do the card flipping. This person will also be keeping track of what is flipped over.

The other two (or can be more just divided into teams) will be looking at the numbers and placing down characters.

*To start, give each team their forest animal cards and their forest scene. Note: if you still have the small animal cards from last week's math activity you can reuse them for this one!


*Divide the "flip cards" (the large cards- one set of numbers, another set of forest animals) into two stacks.

*The flipper flips over a number card and an animal card. D0 NOT TELL THE TEAMS WHAT THE NUMBER IS, ONLY SHOW THEM. This way they work on their number recognition.

*Each team then places that number of animals (the one the flipper flipped) into their forest scene-NOTE: the flipper must place the animal and the number together in a way to make sure they remember which animal goes with which number.

*Once all cards have been flipped over, the flipper checks each team's work. Whoever has the most correct number of each animal wins!

Example: Child(ren) should place one deer in their forest



Science Activity: Footprints

What you need for this activity:

- *Animal footprints pages
- *Play dough

Directions:

For this activity, your child(ren) will make predictions about animal's feet. First, read the information about the animal (see below). Then ask your child to look at the feet page and guess which footprints belong to that animal. (Answer key provided on last page).

My feet are actually called hooves and they look like they are split into two pieces. My hooves help me be able to jump and turn quickly when I need to! Can you find my foot?




My feet are webbed which means there is something connecting my toes so that I can swim really well in the water. Can you find my foot?
